Armenia 4-9 September

Armenian Cadastre Committee



During the visit, the Dutch ambassador to Armenia, Nico Schermers, emphasised the importance of the project and the ongoing cooperation. With a notary, the group discussed the procedures of the Dutch Kadaster law and

the relationship to the work of the notary. At the Kadaster registration department, the group got inside information on those processes, and a visit to the Kadastermuseum revealed the historic evolution of registration and surveying processes. The group also visited the National Archive of the Netherlands in the Hague. Kadaster presented and shared information on enterprise architecture, records management, innovation processes, and the Dutch legal system.

Albania 28-30 September **State Cadastre Agency**

Among the delegation were the CEO, directors and sector chiefs representing various departments of State Cadastre Agency. The programme was full of presentations and discussions to make optimal use of the short time available.

We talked mainly about organisational-change aspects, such as the role of a multi-annual strategy, business plan, and the role of Kadaster in society. Other topics were related to more operational aspects, including how to monitor and anticipate the expected work supply, to



develop products and services, organise customer contact, and human resource management.

South Africa 3-7 October

Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development

The delegation immersed itself in various aspects of the system in the Netherlands, including land registration, surveying, spatial data infrastructures, rural development and spatial planning. We visited the Ministry of Agriculture, Nature and Food Quality and the Ministry of the Interior and Kingdom Relations, under

which the department of spatial planning sits. Discussed topics were highly relevant for South Africa, where improving the recordation of land rights is top priority for tenure security, land policy, and socioeconomic development.

Indonesia 24-27 October

Ministry of Agrarian Affairs, Spatial Planning and National Land Agency (ATR/BPN)

The study tour had been long-awaited, originally intended to take place in 2020, but was delayed several times because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

ATR/BPN is transforming from a surveying/mapping organisation into a customer-oriented digitally driven land administration agency. The week-long visit enabled participants to gain insights into Kadaster's own transformation experiences, including organisational redesigns, legislative aspects, process re-engineering,

IT redevelopments, and community engagement. They visited offices in Apeldoorn, Arnhem, and Zwolle. Also, they got an update from Indonesian colleagues currently studying at ITC, University of Twente, in Enschede.

Results from the study tour are being used to refine plans for the next phase of collaboration between ATR/BPN and Kadaster.

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Ambition for nationwide land registration in Benin

During his visit to the Netherlands in October, President Patrice Talon of the Republic of Benin discussed with Kadaster about modern land administration.

Dutch inputs

The Netherlands' own system is built on the principles of nationwide registration, systematic updating, full digitalisation, and a financially autonomous cadastral organisation.

Achieve goals together

President Talon expressed his ambition to realise a nationwide cadastre in Benin. An efficiently organised land administration system is indispensable for boosting the economy, levying taxes fairly and supporting food and legal security. He has invited Kadaster, together with its partner organisation in Benin l'Agence Nationale du Domaine et du Foncier, to develop a plan on how to achieve this goal in the short term.

300,000 plots

This is a follow-up to the 5-year land administration project that Kadaster is currently carrying out in Benin together with the global consulting organisations MDF and VNG international. In this project, Kadaster is developing cadastral procedures and systems, supporting organisational development and the registration of over 300,000 rural and urban plots.

Showcasing different methodologies in Chad

From 10 to 15 October, Kadaster demonstrated 5 different methodologies to collect spatial and administrative data in Chad. The demonstration took place in two different communities outside of Ndjamena. We applied different options for data collection, processing, and visualisation, both in the office and in the field. We showed the use of conventional total station surveys, participatory mapping both paper based and processing with SmartLandMaps, mobile mapping with both Trimble and Esri technology, and automated feature extraction. The different organisations and stakeholders involved created a dynamic setting with discussions about the methodologies and their technical, financial, institutional, and legal implications. In the end, the Chadian and international experts agreed 'that not one methodology fits all' and underlined the importance of community involvement in any land administration activity.

Progress in Colombia



With the election of a new president in Colombia, a completely new team of ministers and top-level officials was installed. That is why in September and October, Kadaster had meetings with the new Minister of Agriculture and the new directors of both the National Land Agency and the National Mapping and Cadastre Agency. All of them expressed the need to considerably speed up the land formalisation and administration activities by applying a Fit-For-Purpose approach, following the methodologies of the current projects by Kadaster and its partners.



The two current projects, Land in Peace and Land at Scale, focus on securing land rights in three types of areas: post-conflict, indigenous and Afro-American. Meanwhile, another project in which Kadaster was partnering, was finalised. In this project, led by Twente University (the Netherlands) and Universidad Distrital (Colombia), new curricula were designed in order to integrate the Fit-For-Purpose land administration approach in the academic and vocational education programmes.

Fact-finding for Kazakhstan

Kadaster undertook a brief project in Kazakhstan to advise on improvements to the agro-cadastre. We did a desk study, followed by a fact-finding mission in July 2022. This included interviews and meetings with key stakeholders. Besides system fragmentation between agencies, there is need for technical support to map the country. We also provided a plan for obtaining financial support.

Recapping FIG in Warsaw, Poland

Kadaster delegates were highly active at the XXVII FIG congress in Warsaw, Poland - chairing committees, delivering presentations, and engaging in technical discussions. Key issues included the importance of young professionals, showcasing Kadaster's approach to innovation, illustrating how citizen involvement can be activated, and debating open data and privacy.
