# Towards more effective land administration in South Africa



The Dutch embassy in Pretoria asked Kadaster to work with South African government agencies and local organisations to develop and test an effective land registration methodology.

The Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development (DALRRD) and Kadaster aim to develop a Fit-For-Purpose methodology to record unregistered land rights. As part of this project, Kadaster undertook an alignment mission to South Africa from 22 to 28 March.

### Input from multiple stakeholders

We identified possible pilot areas with stakeholders and held a first workshop on the methodology to integrate and combine different data for a centralised system of land administration. To ensure the pilot is as representative as possible, we sought input from multiple stakeholders, including DALRRD, the Dutch embassy in Pretoria and local NGOs.

### **Project aims**

We support DALRRD in exploring a prototype for a land information system by:

- strengthening the institutional capacity of DALRRD as the responsible authority for land administration, agriculture and spatial planning;
- finding a methodology to map unregistered land rights;
- designing a visualisation of a combined system for the cadastral map and land registry;
- involving communities and farm dwellers to understand their situation and needs regarding land rights and the agricultural use of the land.

The project will run until the end of 2024 and is made possible with funding of the Dutch Enterprise Agency (RVO).

# The power of institutional collaboration in Togo

The population in Togo is growing fast, like in other West African countries. For this reason, the Togolese government is working to secure sufficient food production in Togo. In August 2022, the Ministries of Urbanism, Agriculture, Finance and Spatial planning started a 4-year land reform programme in order to accelerate agricultural productivity (LRAP). The programme is financed by the United States of America through the Millennium Challenge Cooperation (MCC). Technical support is provided by a consortium of VNG international, Cadasta Foundation, WiLDAF and Kadaster.



### Increase investment

The main objective of the land reform programme is to improve the security of land tenure with the aim to increase investment in the agricultural sector. In the current situation, only few land parcels have been formally registered in Togo. Information about land is not easily accessible for those who need the information.

### A common view

The Togolese government is ambitious regarding land reform, however, an overall vision on how to obtain an integrated and nationwide land administration is still lacking. Therefore, in May 2023, Kadaster and its consortium partners organised a strategic workshop about the power of institutional collaboration for the four ministries involved in the LRAP programme. Keywords during this workshop were interoperability and standards, like the Land Administration Domain Model. The result of the workshop was synergy between the four ministries: a first step was made towards a common view on the development of land administration in Togo.





### **Recognising Brazilian indigenous land rights**

The Brazilian 1988 Constitution accomplished an important innovation: it gave indigenous people the original rights over their land back. Based on this legislation, until 2017, around 435 areas



with a total of 105 million hectares were given back to indigenous people. But there are at least 247 new areas, under threat of invasion, to be regularised for different ethical groups.

### **Improve process**

Kadaster took part in a technical trade mission and met with partners like the Instituto Governança de Terras, the Dutch embassy in Brazil, the University of Pará, and the Global Land Alliance. Part of the discussions were project opportunities from USAID and Brazilian funds to empower and improve the indigenous land recognition process.

### Large impact

The secretary of Indigenous Territories Eunice Kerexu, from the newly created Indigenous Ministry, stated: "We are in high need of international assistance, with new technologies, with an integrated and adequate methodology, to clarify and give back land rights to the indigenous people. An activity like this can have a very large impact on the improvement of the wellbeing of the indigenous people and on the protection of the Amazon forest".



## How to improve the obstacle registration in Dutch airspace

Flight safety in the Netherlands Flight Information Region (FIR) is a big challenge for a densely populated and economically active country like the Netherlands. To support efforts, the web application Verbeter de Luchtvaartkaart (VDLK) was launched in April 2023. Anyone can report obstacles higher than 15 metres which are not published on an aeronautical chart, such as wind turbines and light masts. This allows pilots to plan and navigate with the most up-to-date information.

### Map for all users of Dutch airspace

Kadaster developed the platform on behalf of the Defence Geographical Agency, together with the Royal Netherlands Airforce, Aviation Police and ANWB Medical Air Assistance. Apart from the use by aircrafts and helicopters of these organisations, the map is also of interest to all other users of the Dutch airspace, including the growing drone-user community.

### Safety

In the past, there have been two accidents involving Royal Netherlands Airforce helicopters. This sparked the Dutch Safety Board to prepare a report. This revealed, among other things, that the mapping material involved was not up-to-date. With VDLK, Defence is doing everything possible to prevent such accidents.

### Solid and usable product

Frank Tierolff, chair of the Kadaster board, is enthusiastic: "This cooperation has been very constructive. The Defence Geographical Agency and Kadaster have continuously strengthened and complemented each other, resulting in a solid and usable product.

Besides providing reliable insight, increasing the timeliness and completeness of the data are an added value for flight safety within Dutch airspace."



# Knowledge exchange on mass valuation and sales price registers in Banja Luka

In April 2023, Kadaster organised a workshop in Banja Luka, capital of the Serbian Republic, one of the two state entities of Bosnia & Herzegovina. This workshop was part of the SPATIAL II project, in which Kadaster supports 8 sister organisations from 6 countries on the Western Balkan on topics where the use of geospatial data plays a big role. In this case the topics of mass valuation of real estate and sales prices register.

### **Request for support**

The Republic Administration for Geodetic and Property Affairs (GARS), together with colleagues from Serbia, Albania and the Federation of Bosnia & Herzegovina, expressed interest in getting support on the themes of

mass valuation and sales price register, as they have the task to develop and execute this process on the national level.

## International examples of mass valuation

Based on the needs and interests of GARS and the other participants, international examples of mass valuation were presented during the workshop. The Dutch perspective was provided by Kadaster and the Chamber for Real Estate Assessment, while experts from Sweden, Denmark and Brazil shared the details of their national solutions. Based on these examples, there was a lively discussion between the participants on different topics, e.g. the

Albanian delegation was interested in the amount of geo-variables that can be used as input for mass valuation, while Serbia raised the issue of working with the right national partners in the implementation of the real estate tax policy.

### **Increase transparency**

In general, all participants aim to increase transparency in the availability of geo-information and to reduce practices that could lead to corruption.
